GLOUCESTERSHIRE ASSOCIATION OF BOYS' CLUBS

The Annual Report provides us with the opportunity of reflecting on our year's work, highlighting the developments that have taken place, the work the Association and our member clubs does for young people and for us to thank our very many friends and supporters. At the start of this year's report we are delighted to be able to record the recognition that has deservedly been given at the highest level for the dedicated and unselfish work carried out over 35 years for Nailsworth Boys' Club by Arthur Humphries. Arthur's work was recognised by Her Majesty The Queen, when she awarded him the B.E.M. in the New Year's Honours List. The award was presented to Arthur by the Lord Lieutenant, Colonel Gibbs, during an evening organised by the Club to mark Arthur's retirement as Leader/Secretary. This was attended by many former members and their families who had travelled literally all over the world to be present.

Later during the year Her Majesty again recognised the contribution given to the community by Ivor Wakeman, former Leader of Grosvenor Youth Club and currently Chairman of the Association's Sports Committee. Ivor was awarded the M.B.E. in the Birthday Honour's List, having been nominated by his employers, Smiths Industries.

The Association was saddened to learn during the year of the retirement due to ill health of Peter Clarke, the Education Officer with the prime responsibility for the Youth & Community Service in Gloucestershire since its reorganisation in 1974. This coincided, but fortunately not for the same reasons, with the retirement of Councillor Peter Robins as Chairman, G.C.C. Recreation & Leisure sub Committee.

We have been pleased to welcome the positive approach to youth work that has been brought to the county by their successors and to the open approach to future development that was demonstrated early on by the Association's participation in Youth & Community Service Workshops and training sessions when the provision in the county was reviewed. This was obviously the first step towards determining the policy and future strategy for working with young people and the Association and Clubs are anxious to make a full contribution.

During the year we said farewell to Michael Richards our Honorary Treasurer for only a year; promotion at work has taken him out of the county, and to Colin Fay, the detached Youth Worker in Cheltenham who has made such a valuable contribution in the Moors, St Pauls and Elmfield areas of Cheltenham. However, we have welcomed new Clubs to the Association: Berrow Wood School, Gas Green Youth Club, Kemble Youth Club and Sharpness Youth Club, whilst we have been delighted to welcome new people on to our Executive Committee, Ian Marsh, David Stickels (GCC Principal

Youth & Community Officer) and Simon Smith who has taken on the duties of Honorary Treasurer. Also, we were very pleased to welcome to the Committee two young men, Andrew Reece and Tom Garvey, who whilst not formally representing the membership of Clubs, are able to give a view to the Committee of the way our work is received.

Life in Clubs has been demanding as ever and we have been pleased to assist the developments that have taken place in so many. Smith's Charity have once again been most generous in their support and some 25 Clubs took advantage of applying for grant aid which the Association was able to support. In a slightly more modest but nevertheless most welcome way, the NABC has through its Development Fund, been able to give several grants to Clubs. We know from meeting and working alongside members of Club Management Committees that there are a great many people who continue to accept very real responsibility for the work of clubs and the provision of extensive facilities and resources. However, we are very much aware that in almost every Club there is a need for more people to become involved in the work and share in the provision. Too often the willing are doing too much and others must be found to share the load. The Association has again found it necessary to devote much of its resources to supporting several specific Clubs and we are encouraged by the progress that has been made, thus enabling us gradually to reduce our heavy involvement in order to assist others. Our practical support continues with the provision of an extensive programme of events and competitions, which is reported fully later in the Report. This has been strengthened by the availability of games and activity equipment that is gradually being built up to be made available on extended loan to Clubs, thus widening and adding variety to a Club's programme - again details are given later in the report. The development of these resources has been greatly assisted by a grant from the BBC Children in Need Appeal. The equipment is there to be used by all Clubs.

We are grateful to such Trusts as the 'Children in Need' for their support of specific projects but once initiated, continuing support can become a problem. With us the challenge is greatly eased by the work of our Fund Raising projects. The well established Piano Recitals organised by Dorrie and Arthur Brown continue to be well supported and obviously enjoyed. Two such events were held at Stowell Park and Batsford Park when young pianists with obvious talent and potential, Susan Bird and Sally Bishop, provided delightful music; a very good buffet and the hospitality of Lord & Lady Vestey and Lord & Lady Dulverton on both occasions contributed to two socially and financially successful events. Our Annual Carol Concert was forced to find a new venue this year when extensive damage was discovered in the roof of Thirlestaine House. Derwent Hall on The Park site of the College of St Paul and St Mary proved to be a most attractive alternative and our supporters once again enjoyed themselves, joining in with and listening to the Thames Head Singers and their guests in a traditional seasonal celebration. The less conventional 'Sponsored Jailbreak' was again well supported when 17 teams were 'released' from Gloucester Prison by the Governor and escaped for 12 hours and in doing so raised £4,000 - half of which the teams then gave to their favourite charities.

One aspect of Club work which this Association has developed to a far greater degree than most, is our programme of training for young people at work. A crucial factor in this success has been the active support and involvement of Training Officers of the companies using the courses. This has meant regular reviews of programmes and continually changing content of the courses. New features of this season's 'Adjustment to Industry' Courses held at Cowley Manor were the introduction of a business simulation exercise (which later in the course provide the basis for the students project) and the introduction of a formal

Dinner, with Guest Speaker, on the final evening - both undoubted successes and now firmly in the programme for future Courses.

Our second stage 'Attitudes in Industry' Courses were again held at the Poole & Dorset Adventure Centre where one of the four weeks was specifically for YTS Trainees. The third stage Courses 'Responsibility in Industry' were held at our well established venue at Plas yr Antur, now independently operated and thus able to respond more easily to our needs. This was quickly evident with the introduction of Windsurfing to the programme and with the emphasis given to the students' project presentations. In all some 370 students (young men and women) attended 11 weeks of Courses at these 3 Centres during our 1986-7 season.

In a county such as ours it is encouraging from every point of view that the Voluntary Youth Organisations work closely not only with each other but also with the Local Authority. In the past year we played an active role in the Council of Voluntary Youth Services and served on its Working Party concerned with recommending the priority of spending for the Capital Building Programme. With colleagues from the LEA Youth Service we promoted and ran joint Archery training and competitions and a Video Workshop for Leaders. We also joined with the Glos. Youth Association in running a Training Day introducing Leaders to 'New Games'. This was so successful that it had to be repeated. The Oxfordshire Association of Boys' Clubs made available to us a 'Pop Quiz' that had been pre-recorded on Video and Cassette. As an activity this was clearly equally suitable for girls as well as boys. We therefore asked the GYA to join with us in running the event which proved remarkably successful and was enjoyed by over 250 young people.

The Kerne Bridge facility that is greatly enjoyed by many youngsters each year has had to remain closed this season. We are pleased to say that this is for the best of reasons; our fund raising for the renovation of the Kerne Bridge Adventure Centre reached a level that has enabled us to appoint contractors and the work is well under way. Hopefully the Centre will be in use by the end of '87 and with improved heating and insulation it should now become available all year round.

The support we continue to receive from the NABC is extensive, varied, and very much appreciated. At Association level professional support from colleagues both at NABC and Constituent Organisations is fundamental to our organisation and crucial to the range of activities and events that are on offer to Clubs. Financial support by the way of grants are always well received; yet there are many other ways in which the NABC and its staff have given very direct help to Clubs and members. By referring to some examples we take the opportunity of saying 'thank you' and also we hope, sow the seeds in the minds of other Clubs so that they too may take advantage of these quite extensive facilities. Through the NABC Jubilee Appeal a quite superb Adventure Centre at Glenborrodale is available free of charge to Clubs. As if this were not enough the NABC also provide substantial travel bursaries to reduce the costs of using the Centre even further. St Michaels Boys' Club at the Salesian School need no second telling; they enjoyed their week there so much they have already put their booking in for 1988 - at that price who can blame them!

Hereford Lads' Club, as part of a major fund raising campaign, took advantage of the skills of the NABC Press Officer, John Lloyd. During one of their meetings John learnt of the concern of members for Drug Abuse in Hereford City. From this there developed

an extensive Drugs Awareness campaign which culminated in the whole cast of 'Grange Hill' spending a day at the Club involving themselves in workshops and seminars together with professionals and parents. They also helped to run discos for the young people.

Those attending our AGM last year will have heard of the developments taking place throughout the movement with the introduction of the NABC Training Programme and will be aware of the enthusiasm that David Hutchinson brings to his post of Assistant Director (Training). Several manuals are now available to assist with the introduction and induction of people to our movement. An initiative at more local level by Ron Todd, NABC South West Regional Officer, was the booking of the Poole Sail Training Cruiser and subsequent arranging of grants so that members of Clubs from all over the South West could come together for the experience of a lifetime - spending a week sailing in the Channel and visiting France, Guernsey and the Scilly Isles.

If to these examples we add opportunities in creative activities, fund raising through Club Week and an extensive programme of physical activities, it is clear to see that we are well served by our National Association and its staff.

Our Report would not be complete without taking the opportunity of thanking all those individuals, Trusts, Charities, companies and other organisations, without whose support it would not be possible for the Association or the Clubs to do their work;

Our sincere thanks to:

Gloucestershire County Council, not only for their substantial grant but also for the support so readily given by their staff.

Smith's Charity for their continued support of both the Association and the number of Clubs they are able to help and encourage by their support each year.

Club Leaders, Helpers and Management Committees, without whom the Clubs would not exist.

All the many friends, supporters, companies and Trusts who do so much to support our work, and through their generosity bring a great deal of enjoyment to the young people of Gloucestershire.

HONORARY TREASURER'S REPORT AND SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTS

Year Ended 31 March 1987

I have continued the practice established by my predecessors of including only a summary of the Accounts in the Annual Report as it is known it provides the majority of our readers with a clearer picture of our financial position. Copies of the detailed audited accounts are available upon request, or can be inspected at the Association's office.

The summary over the next two pages show that the Association has had another satisfactory year with grants and donations slightly increased on previous years; this reflects additional efforts made by our Fund Raising Committee and a particularly successful Sponsored Jailbreak. Our reserves have intentionally been built up, mainly as a result of our appeal for Kerne Bridge Adventure Centre. By the time this report is published the renovation scheme should be well underway and this will have used a sizeable amount of our funds.

I am pleased to draw attention to the continued level of support we receive as a result of our Industrial Courses which have this year made a slightly increased contribution to our funds.

The wisdom of my predecessors is evident in the favourable interest rates of our long term investments in government stocks. I should however, give warning that our balances next year are unlikely to look quite so healthy for reasons previously mentioned.

SPORTS & ACTIVITY REPORT 1986/7

Generally our Sports events, administered by the Activity Committee who meet regularly throughout the year, have been reasonably supported by Clubs.

Following our County events the winners have gone through to NABC Regional and National events in many age groups at Five-a-Side Football, Table Tennis, Badminton, Pool, Darts, Snooker and Chess. The Under 14's Five-a-Side competition attracted a good entry due to sponsorship by Littlewoods, that resulted in the National winners playing at Wembley prior to the League Cup Final; alas, this did not turn out to be a GABC Club (perhaps next year!). Table Tennis just about attracted enough competitors to justify the event, this is very disappointing although an increased entry in Badminton ensured a full day's keen competition. Our Darts event was well supported in both age groups.

Following the NABC South West Regional Festival of Sport boys from Nailsworth Boys' Club and Coleford Youth Club won through to NABC National Finals. Also Andrew Stratford and Steve Rodway (Nailsworth BC) in the Under 16's Doubles Table Tennis, won through to the National Finals winning their event to become National Champions. This was a notable achievement as only this year they had moved up from the Under 14's section where last year they were Runners Up!

Although we ran a successful Cross Country event (at the second attempt) it was too late for boys to compete in the NABC National Race. Two successful Fishing contests have been held, one at Frampton Lake in October, the other on the Glos & Sharpness Canal in July.

Also, two new activities have been tried, both in conjunction with the Glos. Youth Association and the Local Authority, these being Archery (both an indoor and outdoor event) and a Video Pop Contest that was held at a number of clubs throughout the county.

Our decision to move the Chess from a weekend to an evening event proved right, as a much improved entry from previous years was the result, with the winner competing in the NABC National Final. On the Football field, once again we were not too successful, being heavily defeated in the final round match against Devon in the NABC Gillette County competition. Unfortunately the initial entry from clubs for the last two seasons has not been numerically good, or the abilities outstanding, and we are aware that members are already involved very much with local clubs and our competition is an addition to an already full programme. It is under review whether we will continue to enter this national event, or try to promote soccer in a different form.

Although we have a number of Boxing Clubs affiliated there were only 2 boys that entered from the Roxburgh House Youth/Boxing Club.

Cheltenham Colts played their annual match against the Boys' Clubs of Wales in the Welsh valleys and gained their second consecutive win by 28 points to 3.

On the Cricket pitch a representative side, although by only 3 clubs, played matches against the Boys' Clubs of Wales and the Oxfordshire Association, winning the former and losing the latter. Unfortunately our Six-a-Side Cricket competition did not receive enough support and was cancelled. Is cricket a club activity these days?

Our other non NABC events - Super Stars, Multi Sports, maintained their usual interest but after a record entry last year only half the teams entered this year's .22 Rifle Shooting competition.

Both Snooker and Pool have proved as popular as ever, with a Pool league running throughout the county on a league basis in addition to the Snooker and Pool competitions leading to NABC Finals.

Three boys from Nailsworth Boys' Club and Whiteshill Youth Club entered the NABC Southern Region Golf Tournament and although not being amongst the prize winners, enjoyed the day on a first class course.

In the Creative Arts area, Peter Kelly from the St Michaels Boys' Club for the second year running, won the Pottery 1st Prize in the NABC Arts Festival and also the Berol Trophy for the best overall entry in the Festival covering Pottery, Drawing, Painting and Photography. It would be encouraging to see other clubs entering work in the Arts.

As mentioned at the start of this report, our events have had reasonable support - but - could some clubs enter more activities, and why is it that some clubs do not participate at all? Perhaps this is an area for review and assessment. Is it apathy, lack of interest or transport problems? Do club members get to know of the events, or should we be promoting other subjects in other ways? Let us know if you have the answers to these pertinent points!!

Last but certainly not least, we acknowledge all our friends of GABC that help to make our events happen - our sponsors, the local Authority, Leaders and Helpers, Business and Works Organisations and others. Many thanks, we are indebted for your support.
