## GLOUCESTERSHIRE ASSOCIATION OF BOYS' CLUBS ANNUAL REPORT, 1974-1975 EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE'S REPORT

Fifty years ago the Boys' Club Movement came into being as a National entity. Boys' Clubs were not, of course, a new idea for in some areas the needs, and in those days the deprivations, of many boys had long been recognised, and it was from pioneer work by individuals mainly in the big cities that there grew an increasing number of Boys' Clubs. It was from the desire of those working in these Clubs to gain wider recognition and better facilities for their boys that the Movement as we know it today was formed. In the ensuing half century there have been changes few could have envisaged, and yet, in the midst of it all, many of the basic needs of young people remain the same. The need for some faith which will outlast the shifting standards of today, the need for trust between one person and another, the need for adults to give generously of their time and their skills; and the need for the boy himself to find his own strengths and weaknesses mentally, physically and spiritually.

During severe depression, through the dark days of war and the following problem years the basic faith and beliefs of our Movement have stood firm. It may well be that today they face their toughest test at a time when many put self before service and power before persuasion, and where every facet of normal behaviour is queried by one 'expert' or another. We live in dangerous times, a babel of voices gives 'advice', in many walks of life leadership has been abdicated or is at a low ebb, inflation rages and strikes near fatal blows at voluntary effort and yet those who work with young people know that most have standards and ideals and want to build a better future. How we equip them for the task is important and we in the Boys' Club Movement and all who support us have a significant part to play.

In our last Report we forecast a difficult year, particularly where finance was concerned, and present trends have done nothing to relieve that situation for in spite of substantial fund-raising during the year, we did, for the first time in many years, finish the year with a deficit. In the administrative and educational field the upheaval caused by local Government reform has not yet subsided and it is not easy with present pressures to see how the partnership will develop, though at officer level there has been a continuation of welcome support and co-operation.

Paradoxically, faced with severe restrictions on finance and with travel limited by high costs, interests, activity and demand for service have increased, new clubs have joined us, a much wider range of activity has developed, and our facilities have been widely used. Opportunities and physical support for 'Enterprise' outstrip the very fuel we can afford, whilst in training we are leading the field in progressive three year work and catering for increasing numbers.

Some aspects of our work are given in more detail later in this report; the will, the spirit to succeed, and the opportunity for greater progress are all there but we cannot do the job without your help — we have had cause to be grateful for it over many years — now that support is urgent.

### **Congratulations**

It was with a great deal of satisfaction to those directly concerned that after six years of negotiation, frustration, and endeavour, the new purpose built club at Bussage was completed and officially opened, and it was particularly pleasing to see still involved all those who six years before had set this as their target. After all their problems they must be pleased at the substantial use now being made of the club.

Clubs are our basic business and with the high cost of transport hitting us hard we have continued a reasonable but reduced measure of service through visits. Realising these cannot be as frequent as formerly, we have instituted 'Wednesday Call' when at least one member of staff is in the office to receive calls and visitors. Use of this facility is developing slowly.

### **Activity**

Physical activity claims a large place in work with boys and we have this year extended not only the range but the participation, too. Though some National Competitions must be for members only many other events we open to others and this year we were able to offer among other things a weekend of orienteering and camping on a national basis.

Once again we have had a record number of Rugby caps, and an International in Cheltenham and, as seems usual, we have departed early from the All England Soccer scene. Five-a-Side, Basketball, Table Tennis, Darts, Boxing, Angling and other sports have all had their place and some experiments in Junior activities have been undertaken. There is a growing concern about youngsters under 14 years and a number of Clubs now have junior sections. It is almost certain that work in this area will have to be extended.

### **Canoeing**

Canoeing continues to be a number one sport and this year's 100 Mile Canoe Test which finished at Worcester, attracted over 300 canoeists, a good number from our own Country which also provided some of the back-up service to this three day event.

### **Adventure and Enterprise**

We are able to report full booking for our Kerne Bridge Adventure Centre and with every weekend booked as well as a good number of weeks this is a continuing and valued facility — many groups other than our own and from other areas of the Country look on Kerne Bridge as their own. Almost all use it well and we are grateful to

them. It is the occasional 'black sheep' that causes us to have problems.

With the sharp increases in fuel costs we had, of necessity, to limit the operation of 'Enterprise' yet nevertheless it has been to some villages, attended most outdoor events, 'done the 100 Mile Canoe Trip', been fishing, and on adventure weekends, as well as serving as a staff room on industrial courses. The calls now being made for its service and the really desperate need in some areas for this point of contact mean we must seek special ways of continuing with this project which attracts a great deal of interest outside the County.

### **The Boy at Work**

We gave some idea last year of the progress of our training with boys and young men in Industry and a great deal of work has been undertaken by the members of our Joint Industrial Committee.

The outcome is that our three year plan of training is now in full action and even in these difficult times is growing. Last year 200 young men were involved. This year the number will be 300, all on one or two week courses. Plans are being made to maintain personal contact with these young men throughout the year and this could be a valuable development.

### **Leaders and Members Training**

Whilst we look on personal contact with members, particularly over a weekend as an opportunity for training, there have been some formal occasions and a record number of leaders, helpers and members of Management Committees have attended our Regional Conference yet again. On the Senior Boy training weekend this time at Bovington with the army, we were able to fill all our available places very easily. Not enough is yet being done in this way but with almost every date taken up we may have to content ourselves with our present structure for the time being.

### **Sail Training and Kerne Bridge Holiday**

In past years, through the generosity of donors, two boys have been given bursaries on the schooners 'Malcolm Miller' or 'Sir Winston Churchill'. This year in consultation with one of the donors it was agreed to use one bursary to sponsor a holiday for children who may not otherwise get one, and in July ten youngsters will take over Kerne Bridge for a holiday which will include riding, caving, canoeing, climbing and expeditions in the forest.

### **Jubilee Celebration**

The celebrations to mark 50 years of the N.A.B.C. included, amongst other things, a 'Lord Mayor's Show' in London when floats, bands and displays from all over Britain contributed to what

the papers described as 'the biggest and most impressive display by young people ever seen in London'. Salutes were taken by the Lord Mayor at the Mansion House, by the Dean at St. Pauls and by the Duchess of Gloucester at the Law Courts. A packed service at Kings College Chapel was attended by Their Royal Highnesses, the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester who, the following day, spent almost the whole time meeting boys at Crystal Palace which was 'taken over' for national activity finals. Clubs in the Pageant and at Crystal Palace included The Jamaican Club, Nailsworth, Viking and a display from Seymour. 'Enterprise' and the Nailsworth coach were both in the Pageant and in support afterwards.

### Special Events

Two very special events during the year helped to make many of our activities possible. Through the kindness of our President we were able to invite guests to Badminton to a very successful evening of music by Charles Rosen. The second was a New Year's Eve Ball held at Cheltenham College. Both were very well supported and the Ball will be repeated again this year.

### Finance

That we were able to finish the year without a large deficit was encouraging but much was due to the two special events which brought in a substantial amount, as well as to the continued steady support of our subscribers. Every effort has been made to effect economies in administration but these are easily frustrated by rising costs. Inflation is something the voluntary body finds it particularly difficult to combat and we foresee the need for ever greater efforts to raise new money in the coming year. There must these days be a real partnership between voluntary organisations and National and Local Government. In enlisting support we must do our utmost to demonstrate the value of the work we do and seek, on the other hand, help which in its nature and degree is relevant and realistic to our times.

The Executive Committee wishes to put on record its appreciation of the help given to the Association and to member clubs by Our Subscribers, Gloucestershire County Council, the Trustees of Smiths Charity, the Dulverton Trust, the Four Winds Trust, the King George's Jubilee Trust, our National Association, Industry throughout Gloucester and all those who give generously of their time on our Committees, in Clubs, on Training or on projects. Without this widespread support much of what we have been able to achieve would not be possible.

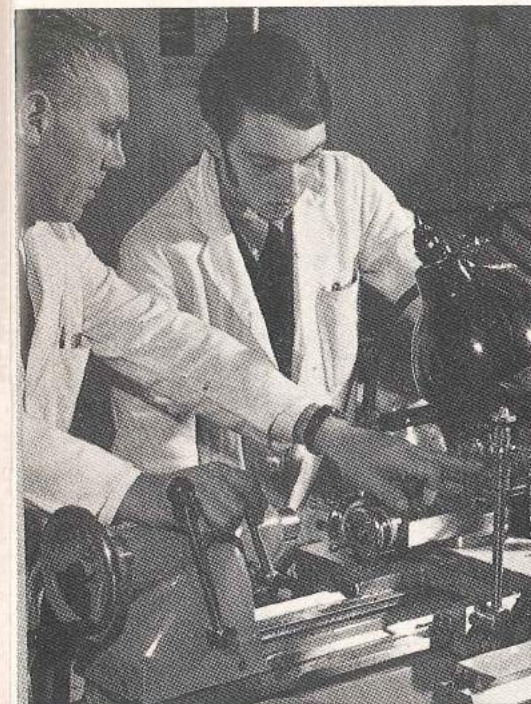


Steve Hill of Shurdington Y.C. swims the Channel in the Boys' Club Team raising money for research into crippling diseases.

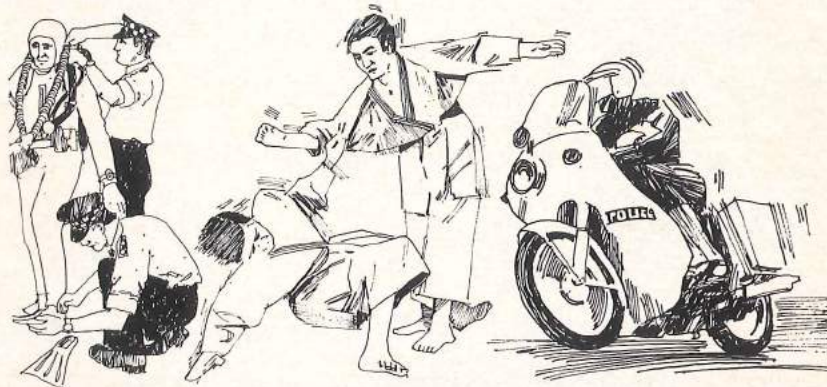

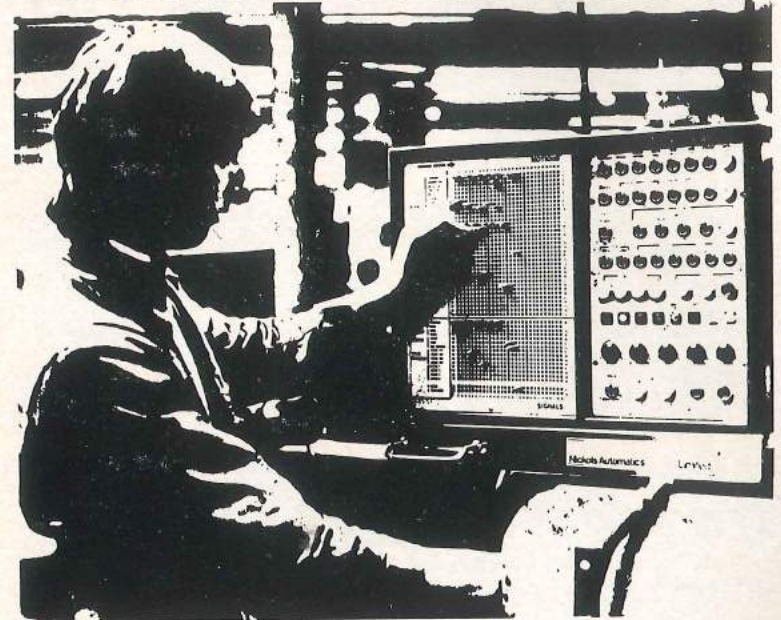
