

#### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

At the end of a very active and successful year, it might be appropriate to present our report in terms somewhat similar to organisations in the industrial and commercial world. Ours is essentially a "service industry", however, and our balance sheet is as concerned with human resources and progress as it is with purely financial activity.

Financially, of course, we remain, like most voluntary bodies, in an unhappy state. Inflation continues to wreak havoc on our costs, and poses a constant threat to many of the services we supply. Yet the demand for our "products" is high, and voluntary efforts are responding to it magnificently. Our human balance sheet has never been so healthy; for it reveals a wealth of assets — in the dedication, initiative and determination of our many helpers — which more than balances the liabilities of our society; its vandalism, rising crime and declining moral standards. The dividends we pay remain high too — the satisfaction of being involved with the development of so many of the young people of Britain.

In strictly financial terms, we find ourselves pressed but not flattened, and we are certainly more optimistic than a year ago. Many member clubs have special problems arising from the inflation of their costs, and the increased national affiliation fees, though obviously necessary, have somewhat strained the relationship between clubs and our movement at County and National levels.

Our "market" is buoyant. There has never been a greater need and demand for facilities and guidance for the young. The rapid changes — both social and economic — of the 70's cause young people a great deal of insecurity, often revealed by permissiveness and violence. They need guidance on personal standards and behaviour, preferably from those whose standards are set uncompromisingly high. In much of our work, we may see an increasing desire for higher personal and corporate standards of behaviour. We like to applaud and encourage these high standards, which may be the reason that the demand for all our services — club work, activities, training — have increased so much over the past year.

The acceptance by society of greater equality between the sexes may be the reason for the growing demand from girls for activities and training similar to, but separate from, those available to boys. In recent months, we have been able to offer some of the expertise we have gained to organisations catering specifically for the interests and development of girls and young women.

The current expansion of our activities — particularly in encouraging the formation of new clubs — means greater opportunity for attracting young men of proven ability. We want a lot

more of them. These eager and caring young leaders who, though always busy people, manage somehow to find the time for further challenge. We can offer them this challenge, and the chance to exercise and develop their talents in a lively and expanding organisation. To them we say, invest in youth. Nothing will give you and the country a better return.

We have, this year, attempted to lay out our report so that we may show in a practical way at least some of our work. The 150 personal awards on our presentation programme are representative of twenty times that number, and you will note that, under our industrial courses, we have been able to offer some ten weeks of programmed training covering some 340 young men and over 50 adults.

I would draw attention to the activities of our training centre. and of the continued and successful operation of our Enterprise project. I would make special mention of those garages and trusts who have enabled Enterprise to function for yet another year.

There are very many people to whom we must express our appreciation, and though we cannot mention them all, we would thank our subscribers, and Mr. Charles Dickins for his very special effort; the Army Youth Team, Industry, the Police and the Education Authorities, as well as the many others on our courses; our leaders who bear the brunt of the work in the field; the members of our Industrial, Executive and Activities Committees; the referees, judges, tutors, speakers, and all those who help in a practical way, and the Local Authority, Smiths Charity, and our National Association for consistent and substantial support.

I would, in conclusion, express our appreciation of the help given with accommodation, at a very difficult time, by the

There are over 50 Clubs in membership of the Association and because these are autonomous they can develop in a way that meets the needs of their own locality and this achieves, too, a wide variety of provision.

#### A PLACE OF YOUR OWN

Whilst each Club may have a different emphasis they have one thing in common in 'belonging' to their members who in their turn must share not only in activity, but in finance, maintenance and many other things that, having a place of your own, involves.

#### SELF GOVERNING

One of the conditions of membership of the Association is that Clubs should offer a real measure of responsibility to members and most have both Management and Members Committees. Both groups can learn much from each other.

#### A CHANCE TO TRY

Perhaps the most important single item to the individual member is the chance to try himself out in a wide variety of situations—activity, committee work, finance, etc., in an atmosphere where problems can be shared and good leadership can aid personal development.

#### SELF HELP

Boys' Clubs don't come as a gift, many people help in their formation and once established the members must be really active in their own support. Many make tremendous efforts to raise funds for equipment, activity and for maintenance — all this a planned part of growing up.

#### HELP FOR OTHERS

Most boys are hesitant to say what help they give to other people — old, young, sick, deprived — all come within the scope of most Clubs. Fortunately, the Club is often the place people come to when help is needed.

#### A STANDARD FOR THE FUTURE

What is the expectation of 'alive young people'? Contrary to the experts most expect adults both to have and show they have decent standards, be reliable and be willing to listen. They very quickly see through the insincere but will give tremendous support to those who set their sights high and refuse to lower them just because it is popular or expedient.

A THREE YEAR COURSE FOR YOUNG MEN AT WORK



Adjustment to Industry, Cowley Manor, near Cheltenham


Here in the setting of a Country Manor Courses of 40 young men just starting their industrial life gather for 5 days to meet people from all parts of industry, local government, etc., and in an open yet disciplined atmosphere take some steps in assessing and accepting responsibility.

Courses are residential over 5 days and 4 are held each year.

#### Attitudes in Industry, Bracelands Adventure Centre, Royal Forest of Dean

For the second year, with the basic disciplines established these courses in a farmhouse in the Forest combine adventurous activity with more formal work. Lectures cover a variety of subjects both industrial and social and students working in groups undertake such projects as planning a new town, setting up an industry or creating new product markets.

Four 5 day residential courses are held each year.



A new venue for our third year courses where personal responsibility and challenge are matched to substantial project work and discussion groups.

A course aimed at bringing forward the knowledge previously gained — putting it to practical use and at the same time accepting the effort necessary for significant personal and collective achievement.



A course of 2 weeks duration.




