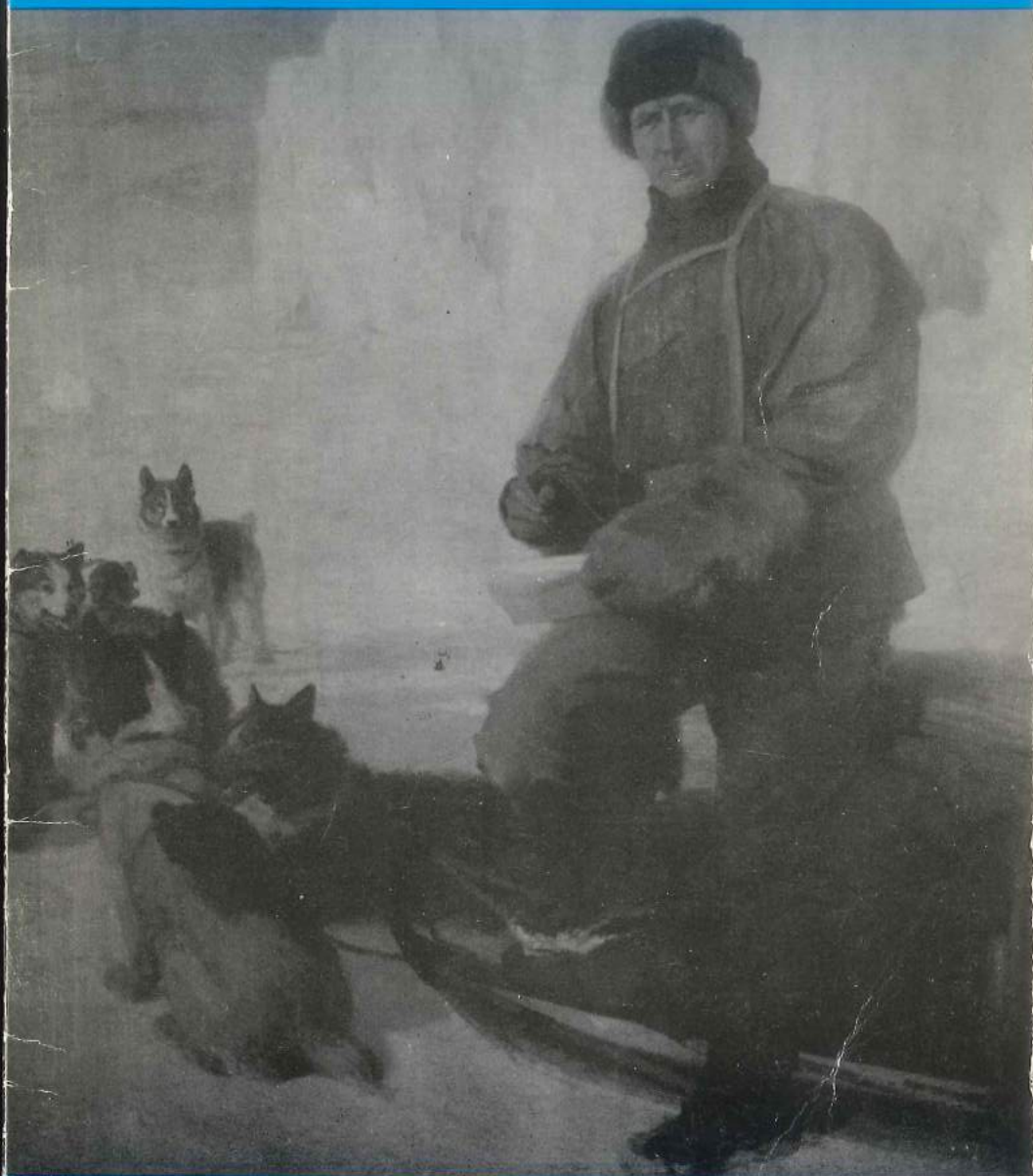

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

FOREWORD

During this Jubilee year much of the emphasis is placed on creating an atmosphere in which young people will help themselves and this is something which is basic to the beliefs of our Association and the Boys' Club Movement as a whole.

Our Industrial Courses and our work in Clubs is aimed particularly at encouraging young men to develop their own capabilities to the full and make the most of any opportunity that offers. This is particularly important at a time when opportunity for many is limited and yet the need for an informed and forward-looking on-coming generation has never been so great.

All would acknowledge that help given to young people is vital to our survival but still not enough are prepared to give their time and their skill. I hope that you who read this Report will not only see the success that has been achieved, but realise how much more could be done with your help.

To say that the twelve months up to April 1977 have been eventful as far as the Association is concerned would be a typical British understatement. Having recently vacated the Headquarters in which we had been established for fourteen years, the past twelve months have seen us housed in a variety of borrowed premises, until, three moves later, we are at last in our present permanent home. The offices are part of the house in which Edward Wilson, the Arctic explorer, was born and where we believe that some of the tradition of service, character-building, and appreciation of the arts in their many forms — such as a part of his life — will be emphasised and continued by our Organisation. It is indicative of the support the Association attracts that by the time the new premises had been altered and converted, the whole of the funds needed to open free of debt had been raised. We owe a great deal to many people and acknowledge that debt elsewhere in this Report.

Moving home three times obviously was not without its problems and sometimes also frustrations. At times the staff, giving quite a bit of somewhat limited free time, turned to as painters, decorators, and bricklayers. Yet, as we look back on the year, we can with some pride point to an expansion in our activities, the attraction of a substantial number of new clubs to our Association, and a significant increase in our programme of industrial training.

Not all has been gain, of course, and some of the less pleasant events were the serious outbreaks of vandalism at Brockworth and Bishops Cleeve which put two clubs out of action and inflicted serious and intensive damage on the building. A great deal is owed to the members of the new committee at Brockworth who have re-established the club, and to Toc H who worked very hard to erase and repair the damage which had been done. There is, as yet, no solution to the problems at Bishops Cleeve.

Once again we have tried to show our year in the classical form, and later pages give our calendar of events. We enclose a programme of our Presentation Night when over 150 boys who have reached the top in their particular sphere will receive awards. I would also draw attention to further significant happenings during the year. First, the establishment of a most successful Superstars event (now to be a regular feature), and secondly, to the very successful Ball which the Round Table organised on our behalf at the home of our Deputy President, Lord Vestey.

No statement from the Chairman can, of course, ignore finance, nor can any Chairman these days afford to be complacent. We have, with particularly generous support, almost balanced our books for the year, but in such uncertain and inflationary times we need to set a high target and increase our efforts still more, even to maintain that position. Providing the means to do the job properly will be one of the main aims of your Committee in the year ahead.

I hope that in the rest of this Report you will get some insight

into the many and varied aspects of our work, and gain an appreciation of the devoted service of so many people who, in these difficult and troubled times, help to light the way to a better future and a better Britain.

MEMBER CLUBS

Over 60 clubs are listed at the end of this Report, each one different in character, dealing with young people in a wide variety of ways. Some clubs are purely voluntary, some supported by Local Authority, some by firms or schools and some, having a specialised activity, be it boxing, chess or music. Altogether these make up the pattern the voluntary organisation so much believes in.

Some have had a very successful year, some have had problems much more than they deserve and to each the Association must offer a constant service of support in difficulty and reinforcement in success.

We welcome new affiliations at Cheltenham, Chipping Campden, Beeches Green, Gloucester, Charlton Kings, Toddington, Worcester and Oddington, and hope they will take every opportunity, not only to use the Association, but become part of the family of clubs of which it is made. We might extend a special welcome to Mrs. Gillian Hewish at Dursley, the first woman leader of a Boys' Club in the County and offer congratulation to Arthur Humphries, leader of Nailsworth Boys' Club, whose completion of 25 years of devoted service was celebrated on a very moving occasion arranged by members old and new.

ADVENTURE AND ENTERPRISE

Of these there has been full measure, some in our Adventure and Training Centre, which has had so much use that for the second time some of the floors have been literally worn away. A visit here is now a 'must' for many clubs from all over Britain and we are, of course, full throughout the year. Apart from club use, social services, children's homes, etc., etc., Kerne will again be the centre for two weeks of Venture in Care Holidays organised by the N.A.B.C. through the National Boys' Club who will provide the staff.

Enterprise, our van and Landrover, suffered from rocketing petrol costs and for some time was not able to travel as widely as before. Support from garages and a special grant will enable normal use to be resumed and we shall, later in the year, be looking for additional crews.

Clubs have many enterprising activities of their own but two particular joint events deserve mention. The 100 Mile Canoe Adventure, undertaken by Walker Croweller Apprentices and Nailsworth Boys' Club, and the Regional Weekend with the Commandos, now booked each year to capacity and aided in great measure by our Assistant Secretary.

ACTIVITIES

Our programme of events pictures our activities, but notable during the year was the largest motor cycle rally of its kind, organised by the Cossacks, and in a different vein the Chess Weekend and a Chess Championship, Cricket at Badminton, Superstars at Blaisdon Hall, Five-a-Side sponsored by Osram, a Brass Band Weekend and a whole range of activity which culminated in our first and very successful Presentation Night when 'Ted' Croker, Secretary of the Football Association, made the awards.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Good deeds rarely make news so much of the worthwhile active help by clubs and individuals goes unremarked. It is a pity but a situation we must accept. Work to see what can be done for Under 14s, help for young people in trouble, aid for old and handicapped, all this goes on and few will know that at the Handicapped Fete Focus 76 the marshalling of coaches, the message carrying and communications support was carried out by members of the Cossacks Club whose help to the Children's Hospital too, rarely gets mentioned. To ask at your local Boys' Club could, for many, be the first step to getting help.

WORKING WITH INDUSTRY

We are justly proud of the work we initiated with Industry and which Industry has so whole-heartedly helped us to develop.

With over 30 firms, the Local Education Authority and the Technical Colleges now represented on our Training Committee we have a pretty effective organisation to progress our work. We shall shortly see the 100th Series I Adjustment to Industry Course by which time over 3,500 boys will have attended this part of our training, add to this the 1,200 more who have been involved in the more recent Series II and III Courses and some measure of the significance of this work may be obtained. No-one should overlook the 800 men who have served a week at a time as voluntary tutors and the very large, ever-widening panel of speakers and project aides.

We are particularly pleased that this year we have had some little influence in aiding discussion and co-operation on the proposals of the new Technician Education Council and pleased, too, that the standard we insist on and our method of approach to work with young people are now not only supported by employers but appreciated by the students themselves. There will in this activity be further expansion in the year ahead, together, we hope, with some concentration on those whose failure to achieve employment is a matter of so much concern.

FINANCE

It is the Treasurer's task to keep our feet on the ground and we are doubly fortunate in the work undertaken and the control exercised by our Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Paul Roberts who though himself responsible for attracting a substantial addition to our funds during the year still keeps pointing firmly to the basic essentials of a sound financial policy. This year we have almost balanced our accounts but in doing so we have depleted our reserves and this is a process we must reverse for no efficient organisation can exist on a deficit for long without the quality of the work being impaired so, whilst 1977 will, we hope, see no curtailment of our activities, it must see an increasingly purposeful drive to secure the means to do the job.

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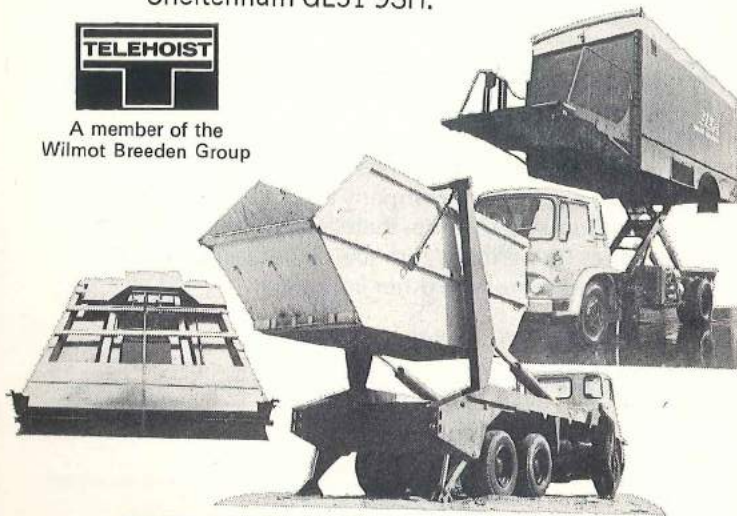
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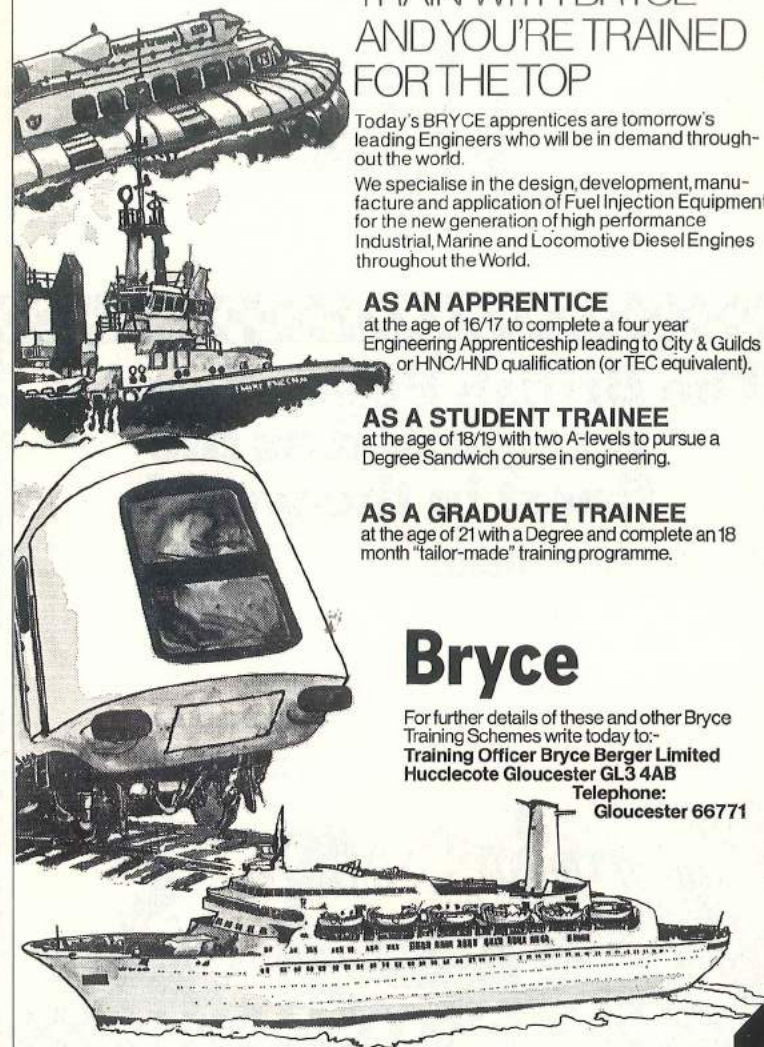
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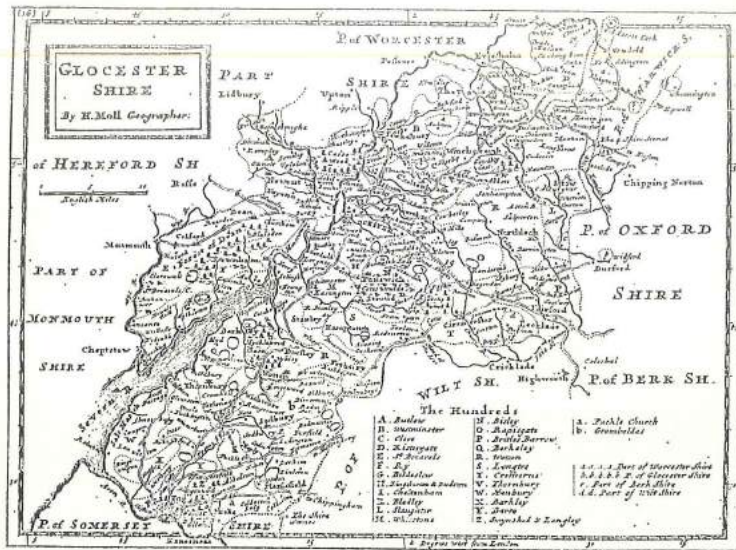
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
