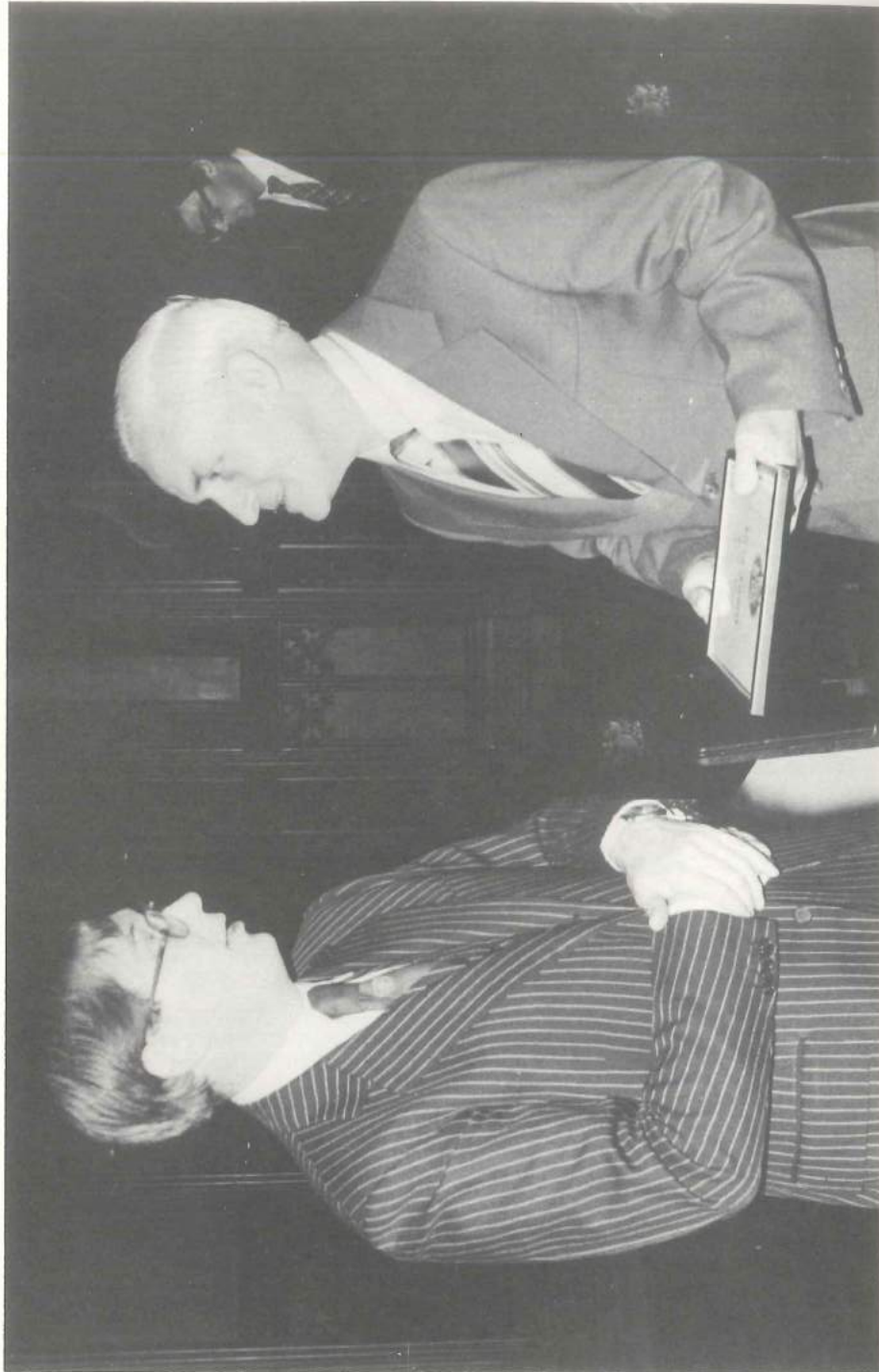

## GLOUCESTERSHIRE ASSOCIATION OF BOYS' CLUBS

### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Few could have looked forward to 1980 as a year of opportunity or encouragement. Our forecast told us that there would continue to be difficulties ahead with inflation putting increasing burdens on industry, commerce and local government. Although during the previous twelve months we had taken a long hard look at our work and our resources, we had to recognize that there would be another year when we would be sorely pressed to meet the increasing demand for our services and help. This proved to be true. Many of our friends in industry are in difficulty and the number of young people out of work has grown. Nevertheless we count ourselves fortunate that much of what we set out to achieve has come to pass though not always as quickly or as incisively as we might have hoped. More Clubs have joined us during the year and the range of our activity has continued to increase. Through the help of many friends our Adventure Centre at Kerne Bridge has again been brought up to standard and been very fully used by both Clubs and Social Services. Indeed, we shall during the coming months be adding to our provision there. We had hoped to expand our range of training for young men at work but the pressures on industry made this impractical so that although our programme was maintained it was not increased except for one notable exception in that a short Course for Trainers was successfully introduced. Inflation affects us all while swingeing increases in the postage and transport on which we depend so much are adding to the problem which will be even more acute in the coming year. We owe a great debt to the many people who helped us finish the year in a satisfactory condition. We know however that to be an effective force we must continue to respond to all that still needs to be done. The needs of the young unemployed are particularly urgent and new ideas and action are needed for what now must inevitably be a long term problem. Some traditional ways of working will have to be challenged and changes made throughout the Youth Service if the aim of helping all young people is to be realized in the circumstances of today. We shall need more money and we shall need more people in the years ahead as we expand our influence and assert the principles for which we stand and for which the world today has so much need.

### GIVE US THE MEN

It's an old saying "Give us the men and we will finish the job", but it is very true indeed today when it sometimes seems that increased leisure be it forced or natural results in even less people offering their time. There are of course a great many who help in Clubs throughout the County but there is a desperate need for more lively people to help in Clubs and on Committees. As times continue to get harder more workers are wanted to find the ways and means to do the job, and this is just as true at the County level as in member Clubs. We must during the next 12 months build a strong Finance and Events Committee if we are to keep ahead in this rapidly changing world.

### KERNE BRIDGE HELPS DURING INFLATION

Our Adventure Centre at Kerne Bridge has always been much in demand but this year the requests for both mid-week and weekend bookings have been more than we can satisfy. One of the results of cut-backs by education authorities in many counties has been that many local authority centres have had to close. Fortunately the voluntary organizations have much more flexibility in staffing and costing so that we are in a much stronger position at this time to handle extra bookings. Well over a hundred groups use our Centre during the year and whilst the majority use it with care we must say that sometimes even those whose profession it is to look after young people do not set an example in consideration and responsible behaviour. We must therefore be more selective in the future. Inevitably with such a high rate of use things wear out and with the continued help of the National Association of Boys' Clubs, the British Broadcasting Corporation and other generous people we have refurbished yet again. This is a never ending task, but when we hear of the eagerness and pleasure exhibited by many of those often less fortunate who use our Centre we feel great satisfaction and all our effort seems extremely worthwhile.

### SPECIAL AND LONG SERVICE AWARDS

Some years ago the Chairman set up a special award for particularly notable service to the Association. More recently the National Association has implemented a merit and long service award which is to be presented annually. At the Annual General Meeting in September the Chairman was pleased to mark the service given to the Association by the following: Mr. George Godwin for service to Whaddon & College Boys' Club and to Mr. Brian Little and Mr. Fred Miles for particular efforts in the field of Industrial Training.

In the following month, October, at a ceremony at the Guildhall in London, His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester was pleased to present National Awards to the following whose record of service and effectiveness was outstanding:

### DEVELOPMENT

Not long ago new Clubs were being built at the rate of three a year. Times have changed and there is little opportunity for new development. Instead more effort is directed at the better use of existing premises and we have been able to help some 16 Clubs extend or make more effective use of their own premises. Other Clubs seeking new avenues of support have taken over much of the responsibility, financial and otherwise, previously borne by the local authority. This is a healthy sign which developed further could increase substantially the effectiveness of local authority funds. An experiment in Cheltenham may well set a pattern to emphasize the effectiveness of a joint approach.

### TRAINING WITH YOUNG MEN

The Association continues to be the only County operating a three year progressive programme of training for 16 to 20 year olds. Despite the grave difficulties that our local industries have suffered, nearly 600 young men have again attended our one or two week residential Courses — a record no one else can come near.

Gloucestershire, Dorset and North Wales have again been the selected venues and though there have been problems in the use of Cowley Manor for our first series we hope that before next season these may have been resolved as a result of some steps we have taken. Dorset was this year chosen as a venue for a new short Course for Trainers so that there could be opportunity to evaluate staff and programme in a very practical way. So successful did this prove that it will be repeated every other year. No mention of training could be complete without paying tribute to the 50 or 60 men and women from all walks of life who voluntarily give their time as Speakers and Tutors on these residential Courses. We thank too the Instructional Staff of the Centres we use who give us service well beyond that anyone might reasonably expect.

### ACTIVITY

There can hardly have been a year with more activity than we now record. Apart from the usual round of inter-club activities which include all the old favourites; sailing, canoeing (with a 50 mile event), a rebuilt athletics meeting and a multi-sports day have been added so there are few weekends without some activity. These are important, not just because they provide opportunities for even the smallest Club to have a wide programme, but also because the standard of organization and control is designed to show young people that proper insistence on standard and sportsmanship add to enjoyment and have a value far beyond the field of contest.

Regionally again more opportunities have been made available with expeditions on Dartmoor, sailing, sub aqua, light weight camping, canoeing and riding. Much of the development in this field has been due to the enthusiasm and initiative of Roy Gouldsworthy the Regional Officer and he will be missed very much by adults and young people alike when he retires later this year.

With many apprentice groups now in membership special encouragement has been given to drawing attention to the many opportunities for young people in industry. We were fortunate that a generous donor made bursaries available for many events and, in memory of a young apprentice, a small fund will continue to be available for this purpose.

### WORKING TOGETHER

Following our efforts last year to bring as many people concerned with Clubs together, it was fitting that the Chairman of the County Council should be the Guest Speaker at our A.G.M. in September. Colonel McLelland pointed out how the present difficult times make it even more imperative for us all to work together to provide better service for young people. Through the year we have tried at meetings with leaders and others to provide a forum for this co-operation and shared experience. The results are generally pleasing but there is still a long road to travel before prejudices and lines of demarcation are overcome. We shall continue our efforts in this programme in the future.

### NATIONAL EVENTS

There has been some decline in National Events in recent years but news from Headquarters indicates a strengthening in this area. Most of the team and individual events have continued and we have been represented at all, with the exception of the Regional Finals when snow closed all roads from Gloucestershire on that particular day. The signs are that we can now look forward to new imaginative activity being offered to Clubs during next year which we know will be welcomed.

### CONCERTS AND CLUB WEEK

Funds are essential to run Clubs and the Association and a number of Clubs make a drive during Club Week to raise substantial sums. Whaddon & College are to be congratulated on again raising the highest total per member and the highest amount of any Club.

The Association too needs funds and a strong Fund Raising Committee is becoming increasingly necessary. Very tentative steps have so far been taken — much more needs to be done but we are grateful to the small number in the supporters group who have already put on one concert for us and have plans for a number of regular events.

### WE THANK

All those who help us in anyway during the year whether in Clubs, on Committees, as Speakers, Tutors or as general helpers. We really are grateful. Particularly we would mention the considerable support given by the Gloucestershire County Council, the National Association of Boys' Clubs, the Trustees of Smiths Charity, the British Broadcasting Corporation and the many more generous subscribers and Trusts whose contributions have not only made our work possible but whose support has continued to give us real encouragement.

### FINANCE

Last year I forecast that the very satisfactory surplus on our Accounts would not be maintained through the current year and this has proved to be the case. We have finished the year with a useful balance but this does not truly reflect some exceptional items of income and increases in our expenditure which only operated over the latter part of the year and we shall see the full impact of these in 1982. Nevertheless the increasing support we received is most encouraging and with the formation of a Supporters Group we can look forward with some confidence to the future.

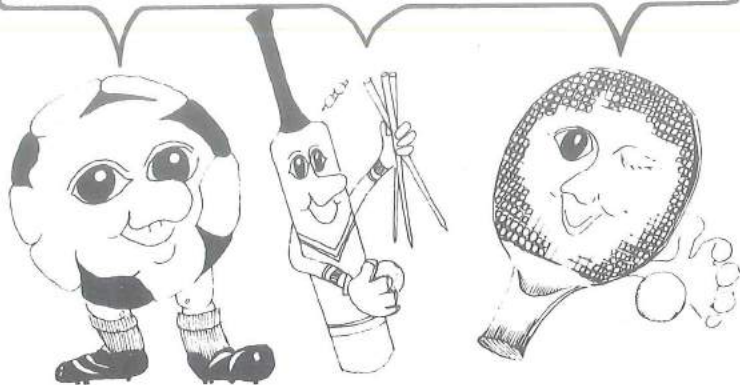

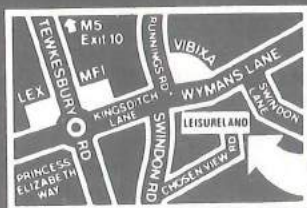

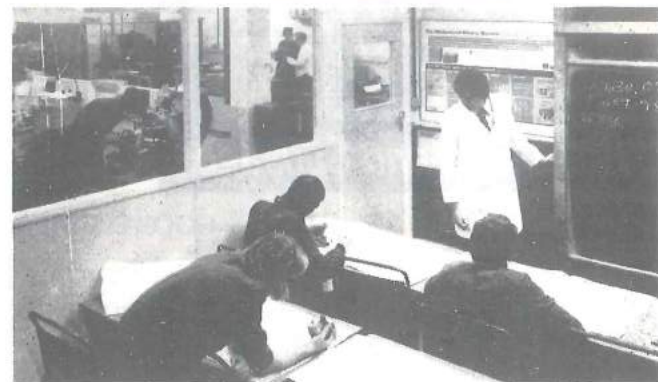
